Whilst implementing your lesson, your classmates will evaluate your performance and provide you with feedback for you to consider when teaching in the future. A: This course is very intensive and requires a great deal of out of class work/reading/research and preparation. How you adapt the learnt material to your project and teaching is one of the principal components of this module. C: A teacher's job is to motivate his/her students to learn. Therefore, your attitude and motivation are an important element within the LP and TP. E: Some of the best ideas and plans fail because of inconsistent or ineffective communication.
